Frequently I reflect on having conversations that seem to have contained an overload of statements but not nearly enough questions. Like others I am sure there are times when I am anxious to get over a point of view, presented as fact, or to pass on selected information that reinforces my position. In contrast, it seems to me, I and others can seem less keen on and less adept at conversations that involve listening, asking, learning, exploring, valuing and respecting others and others' points of view. At worst, we can assume, stereotype or be influenced by inner, unrecognised prejudice or bias. Then the other person, community or people become 'them.'

This may in part be because we don't move as much as we could in circles where we meet people with whom we have little in common. We spend much of our time with those with whom we agree. We are out of practice. We end up living in echo chambers.

It's extremely easy to listen only to the people we already agree with. This can be comforting. But the danger in only mixing with, or listening to such people is that it makes listening to those we disagree with, much harder because we can't hear their voice. We only hear the voice within us that is arguing with them. If everyone is doing this, we move towards an increasingly polarised church, town, nation and world. Some say that this is the path that is increasingly being trodden today.

Elizabeth Oldfield makes such observations in her introduction to her latest edition of 'The Sacred Podcast.' In this scenario, Oldfield asks, "How can we be people who are part of the solution, not part of the problem...?"

In her Podcasts, Oldfield interviews people from a wide range of faith and non-faith backgrounds about what they hold sacred. What they each have is some kind of public profile, such as being a writer, artist or academic. She urges the listener not to scroll past those podcasts that appear to be interviews with people with whom they feel they will disagree. This is bad for us, she claims. She acknowledges the internal struggle that can come from encountering difference, but only that way are we open to learning about the other and to being surprised by how much we have in common. Our difference does not have to become a threat.

In her address to the Baptist Assembly, new Baptist Union President, Rev Hayley Young tackles the issue as it affects our Baptist life together. (See also Baptist Assembly report in June issue of 'Grapevine' Ed.) Her theme for the year is 'Building a bigger table.' Jesus practised hospitality; our challenge is to put hospitality at the very centre of all we do, so that we will welcome more people. In her address, Hayley said this will involve:

"... starting from a place of listening, being contextual and respecting Christ in everyone. Building a bigger table, is about taking time to listen, to hear those who are not like us, who hold different views to us."

We can do this because we have faith in the power of the Gospel that assures us that we are who we are in God because of Grace. This cannot be taken from us. We should, therefore, be able to listen to, value and include each other's unique stories and authentic voice. That way lies blessing and joy, hard to do though it is.

Hayley states that as a Millennial, female in leadership, she daily meets people whose reading of the Bible and perceptions of her age, gender and theology mean they do not think she should be in leadership or have a voice. Hayley finishes by stating that such people may not be willing to listen to her, but that she would love to sit with and listen to them.

Listen, learn, love. And the greatest of these is Love.



WHO IS PAYING FOR POLLUTING THE PLANET?

We all know by now the Climate Crisis is hitting the poorest people in the world the hardest – those who have had the least impact on the situation are the very ones who are suffering the most from its consequences.

"Loss and damage" is the phrase for the destruction already being wreaked by the crisis on lives, livelihoods and infrastructure and it was a critical issue at Cop26 last November in Glasgow.

Vulnerable and poor countries, which did little to cause the climate crisis, arrived determined to win a commitment from rich nations to compensate them for this, but came away pretty much empty handed.

However, it was widely accepted in principle that the most polluting countries, whose economies have benefitted most from industrialisation, should provide the finance required, however in practice, they have been very reluctant to commit to provide the funding required. As Mohammed Adow at Climate Action Network International said "If you had your house burned by fires or destroyed by sea level rise, the proposal the rich world wanted was only going to pay for the expert to assess the damage, but not to pay you to rebuild your house"

The United Kingdom is obviously one of the big polluters historically. That is why organisations are now calling on the UK Government to back the creation of an International Loss and Damage Fund whilst we still hold the COP Presidency, to help compensate those countries affected the most, so they can rebuild communities shattered by drought or floods and, just as importantly, build resilience against the next climate catastrophe. For this fund to become a reality, it will require additional pressure to be brought to bear and petitions such as those mentioned below to be signed to show public support.

If you haven't already done so, please consider supporting this campaign. Instead of those responsible paying for the loss and damage caused, right now vulnerable communities are paying for the consequences with their lives and livelihoods.

THE EXPANDING ROLE OF CATHEDRALS

Cathedrals have a mission to show the 'heart of Jesus'

The Archbishop of York has encouraged cathedrals to continue to ask the 'hard missional questions' about how to transmit the gospel in the world of today.

Archbishop Stephen Cottrell said cathedrals had a mission to show the 'heart of Jesus' in world of "so much hurt and so much confusion and so much uncertainty."

He said: "Our primary vocation is to be the place that serves and teaches... to show the heart of Jesus to others both from our teaching and preaching and evangelising and through the service that we offer," he said.

The Archbishop urged cathedrals to see themselves as a 'work in progress' when it comes to transmitting the Christian faith. Drawing a parallel with the stonemasons yard tour of York Minster, which allows visitors to see stonemasons at work, he said: "What that tells me very, very clearly is this building is a work in progress — it also tells me something else, hugely important, which is that in order for York Minster to be itself, it has to constantly change."

Cathedrals can 'light the way' to Net Zero

England's ancient cathedrals could be in the 'vanguard' of technological development needed for the green revolution. In fact, cathedrals could show the way in making changes for achieving Net Zero carbon across the whole Church by 2030, with a route map due for a vote at General Synod this month (July).

So says the Church of England's lead Bishop for Environmental Affairs, Graham Usher, who is Bishop of Norwich. He points out that cathedrals have an impressive track record within the heritage sector.

Many have already installed green adaptations such as solar panels, or replaced light fittings, or increased draft exclusion. Others have redesigned precincts to give greater access to green space and a chance for biodiversity to thrive. Over two thirds of cathedrals are already part of the A Rocha 'Eco Church' programme.

However, with cathedrals still responsible for around two per cent of the total Church of England carbon emissions, they need to identify more opportunities to meet the ambitious target set by General Synod in 2020. The Church of England's Route Map to Net Zero Carbon will be discussed at General Synod this month (July). (*Parish Pump*)

THIS MONTH 100 YEARS AGO

We continue our series about church life at Marlowes Baptist Church in the 1920's with some excerpts from the August 1922 issue of "Marlowes Notes' in the Baptist Home Messenger:

Personal

Mr Hubert Parris has departed for the Congo. Having heard the call to preach the "glad tidings" he replied "Here I am Lord, send me".

On Sunday evening, July 16th, a valedictory service was held, and expressions of appreciation of Mr Parris's services in the Sunday School and other departments of church work were made by Mr. A. J. Chnnells and Mr. T.H. Dean. A friend of Mr Parris, one who had been connected with him in his work on the Continent, preached, and also added his testimony to the work of our friend, and suitable music was rendered....

The prayers of the Church at Marlowes go up to the Throne of Grace for our brother, asking that his efforts may be blessed and that God will strengthen him spiritually and physically.

Main many souls be turned from darkness to light through his instrumentality.

Choir

On Saturday, July 1st, 1922, Members of the Choir visited the Crystal Palace in connection with the Festival of the Nonconformist Choir Union. Some travelled by train, whilst others preferred the char-a-banc, and arrived there about 11.30. Up to 5.30 p.m. the time was spent in visiting the many side-shows, some of which were interesting, as well as entertaining. The war exhibits were still on view, and demanded attention. The members spent a considerable time in the theatre listening to the competitive choirs. Soon after 5.30 the choirs from various Nonconformist churches in London and the country began to gather on the orchestra, in preparation for the Festival Concert and by 6 o'clock, between 5 and 6 thousand members were seated. There was a similar number in the audience, and the applause of this large gathering was deafening when Mr. Idle, the Conductor, promptly at 6 o'clock raised his baton to conduct

the first hymn, "Jesu, lover of my soul" to the tune "Aberystwyth". The Concert throughout was full of inspiration, and the wonder of it was that one man could lead the vast Choir, the personnel of which up to that time had never sung the various pieces together. Miss Carrie Tubb, the vocalist, was at her best, and at one time was singing against the whole Choir. She certainly deserved the long and insistent applause which greeted her efforts. A very enjoyable day was spent, and the weather was kind.
